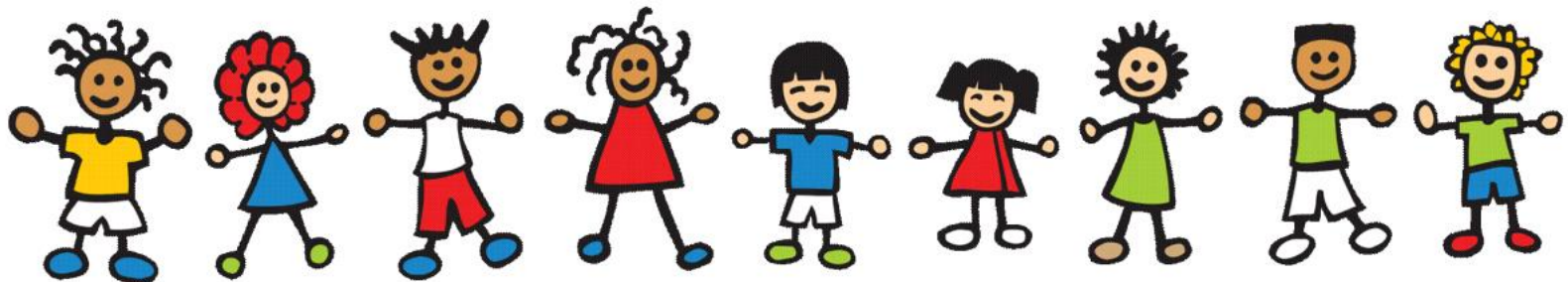

- Lots of praise



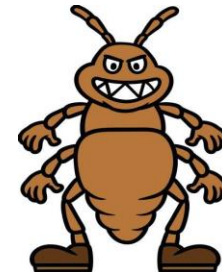
Supporting your child's health and well being

- Coughs and colds

When to seek Medical advice

- **You should also contact your GP if fever symptoms are not improving after 48 hours or if any other symptoms are present.**
- **Be aware of signs and symptoms of Sepsis and Meningitis, www.suttonchildhealth.co.uk or www.nhs.uk**
- Check your child during the night.
- Always seek medical advice if your child develops a fever soon after an operation, or soon after travelling abroad.



Hand Washing

- Common infections in school age children can be spread by poor hand hygiene.
- It is important to teach your child to wash their hands at an early age as regular hand washing is a practical way of preventing the spread of infectious germs.



Other childhood illnesses

Just a few of the common conditions affecting childhood

- Chicken pox .

Do not give ibuprofen as in some cases it can cause a life threatening condition

- Measles

Contact your GP if you suspect your child has measles

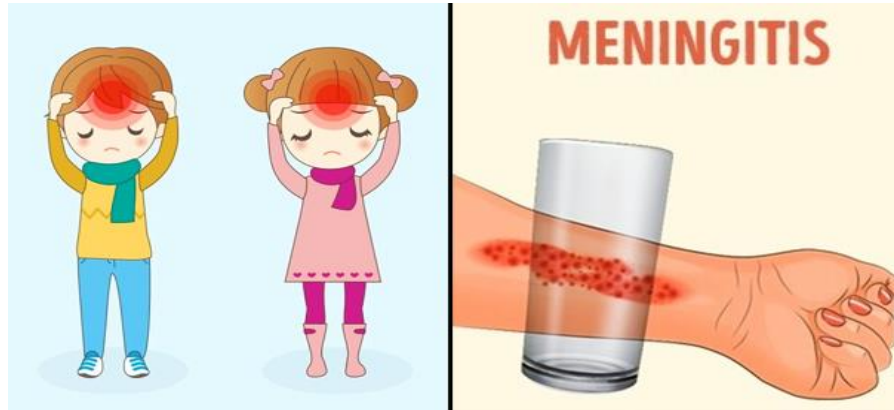
- Croup
- Hand Foot and Mouth

Meningitis

- a blotchy rash that does not fade when a glass is rolled over it, the rash may not appear in all cases,
- high temperature
- headache
- being sick
- stiff neck
- dislike of bright lights
- drowsiness or unresponsive
- seizures



Seek medical advice urgently if you think your child has meningitis



Sepsis

- High or low body temp
- Chills and shivering
- Fast heart beat
- Fast breathing
- Feeling dizzy or faint
- Confusion/ disorientation
- Nausea/ Vomiting
- Slurred speech
- Severe muscle pain
- Severe breathlessness
- Reduced urine output
- Cold clammy. Pale or mottled skin

Seek medical advice urgently if you think your child has sepsis
